IRON COUNTY SUMMER YOUTH CAMP

Iron County Summer Youth Camp once again provided Iron County youth, grades 3-5, the opportunity to enjoy the outdoors with friends and provided the opportunity for youth, grades 8-12, to practice valuable leadership skills and serve as role models in their position as camp staff. Iron County 4-H Youth Development Educator, Neil Klemme worked with his Summer Assistants, Jackie Bradley and Emaleah Niemi, to develop a positive learning environment for all youth who attended.

Campers participated in sessions that allowed them to explore things they love to do in the summer, like swim and play Gaga Ball, but also discover things that they don't always get the chance to do, like shoot archery, play unique camp recreation games, and work with their hands during arts and crafts. All of these sessions are designed to allow campers to explore their sparks. Sparks are a component of the Thrive Model of Positive Youth Development, and serve as part of the groundwork for creating a program that develops thriving young adults into adults. Summer camp is a setting ripe with opportunities to lay the groundwork for building the developmental context for positive thriving outcomes. Camp staff are trained in how to create an environment where youth feel they belong by developing a cabin environment where campers feel welcomed and included, for example. The staff are also trained to make sure campers are engaged in the activities throughout the day. When they see a camper sitting out to the side they are taught how to get them to engage and often times that is through role modeling. This meets the last component of Thriving Youth Development programming, relationships. Camp staff and campers build a bond that lasts a lifetime.

IRON COUNTY OUTPOST CAMP

Outpost Camp was designed in 2015 to fill the gap after Iron County Summer Youth Camp ended and to begin to develop the skills middle school youth need to become great camp counselors. Outpost Camp once again provided the opportunity for youth, grades 6-8, to discover their strengths and explore their leadership styles. These are skills that they will use throughout their lives and will make them more confident and successful camp staff when they are old enough to apply to be counselors.

Part of the keys to the Outpost Camp program is the level of independence that campers are given to "choose their adventure" during the week of camp. Neil and his staff set a schedule that allows the campers to select from a few options of activities during each session. This creates an environment where the youth have a say in their experience, which allows them to engage in activities they have an interest in and explore new sparks that they may have never tried before. The camp works together to build belonging through daily challenges (whitewater rafting was the 2023 challenge activity) and meal preparation. The camp staff are there to offer guidance and support through the challenges and build relationships as mentors.

4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

DAY CAMPS ADD VARIETY TO SUMMER PROGRAMMING

BABYSITTER TRAINING

11 youth participants learned new topics that would prepare them for their roles as babysitter and caregiver, including:

- Child development, safety, and discipline
- CPR and first aid
- True Colors Training
- How to properly change a diaper
- Handling the business matters that come with babysitting
- Making healthy snack choices

Participants were sent home with a babysitting kit and first aid kit. They also received certificates of completion, business cards, and their CPR certification.

STEM DAY CAMP

8 youth participants learned about the areas of their lives where science plays a role every day.

- Day One: Chemistry
- Lessons about chemical reactions that occur in everyday life, as well as conducting experiments about bacteria and the importance of hand washing.
- Day Two: Science and Plants
 Lessons included art projects and plant propagation.
- Day Three: Stuff and Things
 This included building a device that would allow for an egg to be dropped from the playground equipment without breaking the egg.
- Day Four: Food Science
 Tested pH levels, made slime, and shared the results of the bacteria test and culture that was collected earlier in the week.

"Jackie and Emmie did a great job planning lessons that expanded the participants understanding of the world around them", Neil shared. "Science is a spark for both of them and they were excited to share that spark with the youth participants."

SISU ENDURANCE TEAM

2023 was a great year for snow and winter sports in Iron County. The SISU Endurance Team had a full season of 8 sessions of cross country ski lessons and fun with the other kids and coaches in the program.

The team also expanded to include a race team that would enter races and explore the competitive side of skiing. The Hurley School District began partnering with the ski program in 2023, recognizing the Hurley students on the team with a sports letter. The Hurley schoolboard also approved an eight hundred dollar stipend to members of the race team to purchase more appropriate racing equipment.

The program also included opportunities for youth to join the running club in the summer months. Coaches and youth ran trails in the area, such as Miners Memorial Park, Wolverine Ski Trails, and the Iron Belle Trail.

4-H PROGRAM DEVELOPS PROJECT MEETING SCHEDULE

Neil worked to establish project meetings in 2022 and this continued in 2023. Multiple projects, including woodworking, foods and nutrition, pyrography, and sewing were continued into this second year of programming. According to Neil, "The project meetings offer an opportunity for Iron County 4-H members to explore a new interest or spark, as well as gain a deeper understanding of a spark that they may have already had. These sparks could grow to be a career or something that entertains and challenges our 4-H members for the rest of their life."

The adults who have stepped up to serve as project leaders have been trained to be 4-H leaders and all have a deep knowledge of the subjects that they are sharing with the youth. "We hope to continue to grow these opportunities and to include more and more projects each year that offer new experiences for our 4-H members."



HORTICULTURE



Bruce Spangenberg served as Horticulture Educator starting in December 2023.

The Iron County Horticulture program provided educational and technical programming throughout Iron County in 2023. Darrin Kimbler served as the 50% part-time Agriculture/Horticulture Educator through mid-July, with Bruce Spangenberg starting his new role as 50% Horticulture Educator in December.

During the first half of 2023, Darrin Kimbler's programming included:

- Silver Street planters in Hurley with Hurley School 3rd grade students.
- Montreal Historic District planters with Hurley School 4th grade students.
- Adapted an Iron County Fair standards book for the field and crops exhibits at the Iron County Fair.
- Facilitated a 4-week Landscaping with Native Plants series at the Mercer and Hurley Libraries.
- Participated in Bayfield in Bloom Garden Talk on Wisconsin Public Radio.
- Answered walk-in gardening and soil test questions.

NEW BEGINNINGS

Planning began for Spring 2024 Horticulture Seminars to be held in Iron County. Topics planned include:

- Planning a Successful Vegetable Garden
 Topics of discussion include site preparation,
 choosing cultivars, raised beds, space saving
 ideas, mulching, row covers, and other guidelines
 for successful harvests.
- Ornamental Grasses for Northwoods Landscapes
 There are several species, both native and non-native, that make good choices for landscape use in northern Wisconsin. This seminar will cover how to select and grow them to enhance your landscape.
- Keeping Your Trees Healthy


Celebrate Arbor Day week by learning about how trees grow and function, including ways to avoid damage to assure good tree health. Discussion also includes how to successfully plant trees and pointers on pruning.

These seminars will be taught by Bruce and each will be offered in both Mercer and Hurley locations. Home gardeners and individuals working with landscape and garden plants are the target audience.

Ask Your Gardening Question Online

Citizens around the state can contact UW-Extension Horticulture staff with yard and garden questions through the Ask Your Gardening Question online program. Photos of plants, pests, and plant problems can be posted along with questions. As part of orientation of new employees, Bruce has been trained to use the system coordinated by the Statewide Horticulture Program. Iron County area resident questions will be routed directly to Bruce online.

As always, residents can also call or top in the Iron County Extension Office with their yard and garden questions and plant samples.

WHAT WAS DONE IN 2023

Joseph Miller, Community Development Educator, spent the bulk of 2023 serving the patrons of the Hurley Public Library through projects such as:


- A full inventory of library collections
- Establishing a Friends of the Library 501(c)3 in the state of Wisconsin
- Maintaining a monthly Cookbook Club
- Booking a local author for a speaking engagement
- Wondering, "How long must I wait for a responsible adult to arrive?"

The last is a joke, of course—as Director, the responsible adult turned out to be him! So, he did what he could to manage the library's day-to-day tasks along with the long-term projects required to ensure a positive patron experience.

By the time Joseph arrived at Extension in September 2023, he knew all those experiences would assist his transition, but wasn't quite sure how. He spent his

first hundred days trying to give shape to the shapeless (turns out, Extension work is shaped like Wisconsin!), attempting to wrap his head around the intricacies of Community Development, and plugging into the statewide Extension resource network. He did this by:

- Reading books recommended by Iron County colleagues
- Attending local meetings
- Attending statewide Extension conferences
- Participating in training webinars offered through external organizations
- Participating in Extension research team meetings
- Distributing food for the Iron County Mobile Food Pantry
- Submitting a Division of Extension grant proposal
- Talking to folks in Iron County and throughout Extension

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

THE WISCONSIN IDEA(S)

The Wisconsin Idea is Joseph's favorite piece of the Extension puzzle. As a foundational principle for the University, the Wisconsin Idea guarantees that the "beneficent influence of the University reaches every family of the state." He's always been a science fiction nerd and idealist, so the Wisconsin Idea touches the same nerve tickled by Roddenberry's original *Star Trek* and the 2016 film *Arrival*. Like the quasi-utopic vision of those works, it's a promise of a better world through the combined efforts of science, knowledge transfer, and hard work. Here's where the Wisconsin Idea led him in his first hundred days:

The Wisconsin Energy Institute is working on a scalable source of biofuel produced through hearty fast-growing crops like switchgrass and sorghum. Biofuels could be used to:

- Heat a home
- Fuel a vehicle or generator
- Produce vital non-gasoline petroleum products like asphalt
- Generate revenue through agribusiness sales

Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) is a federal program in the early rollout stages aimed at improving internet infrastructure nationally with an emphasis on rural areas. Wisconsin-based research shows broadband internet is:

- Becoming increasingly important to community and economic well-being
- Linked to better business performance
- Linked to higher home values
- Even associated with improved health outcomes for individuals

The UW is also exploring hazelnut production as a viable (and valuable) Wisconsin crop. As a native plant with excellent nutrient density and flavor, hazelnuts could be well-suited as a Wisconsin agricultural staple. As a trail mix connoisseur, Joseph says, "sign me up!"

PLANS FOR 2024

With no shortage of available projects, 2024 will be a year for learning and prioritization. For instance:

- Mercer's Comprehensive Plan is due for renewal and Joseph will be working with members of the town Planning Commission and public to develop a new one that addresses the next twenty years.
- The Iron County Memorial Building has a dedicated group of folks who would love to see a full calendar of events, so he'll work with the Memorial Building Committee to tackle the various challenges that present themselves on the way to achieving that goal.
- He hopes to bring a **Military and Veterans Ball** to Iron County in November to raise money for the mental health needs of our veteran population.
- Working with local and statewide entrepreneurs to bring a 13-week Entrepreneurship Boot Camp Course to Iron County that will walk learners through the business development process from ideation to establishment

Throughout 2024, Joseph plans to keep what he's learned at the center of his work: the value of Extension is its adaptability.

FOODWISE

FoodWlse is federally funded by the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program-Education (SNAP-Ed) and the Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP). With local strengths, FoodWlse supports healthy eating habits, active lifestyles, and healthy community environments for Wisconsin residents experiencing limited incomes through nutrition education at the individual, community, and system levels.

Stephanie Bakker, FoodWlse Coordinator for Ashland, Bayfield and Iron Counties, and Educators, Deb Leonard and Marisa Perlberg provided many educational opportunities to the Iron, Ashland and Bayfield County communities in 2023.

HURLEY SCHOOL GARDEN

In 2023, FoodWise supported the Iron County Health Department and the Maternal and Child Health

(MCH) grant that they received. This grant aims to increase the percentage of children ages 6-11 who are physically active at least 60 minutes each day. It also encourages healthy eating and social connection.

FoodWise and the Health Department partnered to use these funds to enhance the Hurley School Garden space in the following ways:

- Distributing grow bags that youth took home, as well as their own kits
- Adding plants
- Building bench/table conversion units
- Increasing watering supplies
- Expanding food preparation resources for youth, such as potato bags and produce scrubbers

Through this partnership, funds were also used for the Hurley School Kid's Club program. Youth participated in an education series to learn more about taking care of a garden, engaged in a physical activity challenge, and sampled healthy foods.



FOODWISE

PARTNERS & PARTICIPANTS

Partners for 2023 included Mercer and Hurley Schools, five senior dining sites, Hurley Head Start, Iron County Health Department, and Iron County Mobile Food Pantry.

FoodWlse Educator, Deb Leonard continues to provide impactful nutrition education lessons to local schools. Deb's unique teaching style often includes costumes, wigs, props, and games, which makes trying new foods seem exciting and fun!

FoodWlse supports this effort by providing participants with a monthly newsletter that includes information about food security resources, recipes and more! The FoodWlse Team volunteers when able on distribution days.

OFFICE MANAGER

INTERACTION WITH PUBLIC

Serving as the first point of contact with the public, Rebecca provided assistance with requests in person and over the phone for information and resources including:

- Research of UW-based information and response or referral to client.
- Submission of soil samples, plant samples, and insect identification samples to University laboratories.
- Iron County Mobile Food Pantry registration, documentation, and newsletters. Approximately 92,972 pounds of food were distributed to Iron County residents in 2023.
- Maintained and distributed community snowshoe inventory.
 63 pairs were checked out by organizations and individuals in 2023.
- Coordinated reservation of the Iron County Action TrackChair.

EDUCATIONAL OUTREACH

- Distributed monthly "Just in Time Parenting" newsletters to 29 parents of new babies born in Iron County in 2023.
- Organized a healthy living resource bag distribution at the Iron County Mobile Food Pantry that included resources from area partners.

PROGRAM SUPPORT

- Coordinated enrollment and documentation of all 4-H programming in 2023, including the SISU Endurance Team (SET) and summer camp programs.
- Maintained and distributed SET Ski Club equipment. 39 sets of equipment were checked out for the 2023 season.

FINANCIAL OPERATIONS

- Maintained financial records and documentation for Extension and 4-H and Youth Club budgets.
- Maintained office accounting including spreadsheets, vouchers, invoices, accounting and record keeping for grant funded programming.
- Served as liaison to Iron County auditors.
- Processed all receipt collections, deposits, invoices and bill paying.
- Created financial reports for Extension Iron County Committee and, as requested, for the Iron County Finance Committee.

OFFICE TECHNOLOGY

- Served as liaison for office to local computer repair services and to UW-Technology Services.
- Served as office website and social media coordinator.
- Upgraded skills with trainings related to new software programs to create more efficient management of office functions.
- Secured and maintained contracts for leased equipment, maintenance agreements, repairs and supplies needed to run office equipment.
- Researched methods and means for office equipment upgrades.
- Maintained the Iron County 4-H database, 4HOnline.

OFFICE OPERATIONS

Maintained and ordered proper

- level of supplies and resources as needed for office operations and equipment.
- Designed program materials, such as brochures, newsletters, flyers, logos.
- Maintained office documentation to demonstrate compliance with federal civil rights law.
- Maintained postage accounts, equipment records and reports.
- Served as designer and coordinator of the Extension Iron County Annual Report to the Board of Supervisors.
- Coordinated, attended and recorded minutes at Extension Committee meetings.

ADDITIONAL SUPPORT

- Assisted courthouse staff with using the boardroom AQUOS Smart Board.
- Signed on to lead new monthly project meetings through the Iron County 4-H program, teaching youth members about the art of pyrography.
- Attended the FoodWlse North Region Meeting to discuss her part in creating the monthly FoodWlse Newsletter. Holm also created a sharable newsletter template for other counties to use.
- Created and maintained a new Facebook page for the Iron County Courthouse.
- Planned two courthouse staff luncheons. A chili cook off planned as part of UW-Extension's Wisconsin Chili Lunch and an apple social planned as part of the Great Apple Crunch.

AREA EXTENSION DIRECTOR AREA 1

This Annual Report highlights some of the programming efforts of our educators and staff members. In 2023, we experienced some staff turnover and consequently, position vacancies that lasted several months. Our remaining full-time and part-time educator, full-time office manager, and two summer assistants continued their great work and we are happy to report that by the end of 2023, we were back up to full staff, adding one additional full-time and one additional part-time educator.

The success of Iron County Extension programming relies on 4 aspects:

COUNTY FUNDING DONATIONS, GRANTS & FEES STATE FUNDING VOLUNTEERS

In Extension, most educators are co-funded by the county and state. Iron County also supplies funding for a horticulture educator and seasonal assistants for the extensive summer youth programs. In addition, county funds help to outfit Extension with office supplies, technology, program funds and travel costs, as well as an excellent office manager to provide support.

FoodWlse, our nutrition education program, is fully funded by federal SNAP-Ed (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education) funds that

come through UW-Madison Division of Extension. Iron County FoodWlse is part of a three-county project which also includes Ashland and Bayfield Counties. County funds are not involved in the salaries of the FoodWlse Coordinator, FoodWlse Educator, or Area Extension Director.


